# Art of all stripes featured in B. KIND events

The opening of a new art space called 1619 Flux: Art + Activism and the launch of a mini-festival called Louisville B. KIND dovetail this week in efforts to creatively encourage the connection of people across a segregated city.

Most of the events are at 1619 Flux and include a visual art exhibit and projected light installation in the courtyard by Tiffany Carbonneau and Susanna Crum, a poetry brunch and slam with Lance Newman, an active listening event with Theater [502] and comedy from Keith McGill.

The newly opened 1619 Flux is one of four venues for B. KIND, an event organized to recognize Louisville as one of the first cities to sign the Charter of Compassion that encourages fostering compassionate actions through initiatives, policies and projects.

Other B. KIND locations include Luckett & Farley, Muhammad Ali Center and what the festival has dubbed "The Compassion Trolley," which will travel between the three festival sites on Tuesday, April 19, and Wednesday, April 20.

Luckett & Farley will host a hands-on makers' fair from 2-8 p.m. Tuesday, that includes glass blowing, metal forging and fire art play, woodworking, block printmaking and mural painting along with a pay-what-you-can food truck. On Tuesday, it also opens its Makers' Crucible gallery with a 6-9 p.m. reception.
